A WORD FROM CSEI'S DIRECTOR, JENNIFER WALKER

Rising Challenges, Real Solutions

Last year I wrote about solving homelessness and reaching Functional Zero – where homelessness is brief, rare, and non-recurring. We made great strides toward this goal again in fiscal year 2025:

- Housing Helpline call volume fell for the second consecutive year.
- Funding helped 319 people become housed or stay in their homes and not be evicted.
- Our Homeless Program Coordinators continued critical diversion counseling such as problem solving with landlords, transportation, and income issues that relate to staying housed.
- We continue to build private partnerships with people who believe in our mission and are helping us fill funding gaps.

But, to tell you I remain as optimistic as last year would be a lie.

Here's the landscape that we are facing in the counties we serve and across the nation:

- CSEI coordinated the HUD summer Point-in-Time (PIT) count that recorded 69 people living unsheltered in our region, more than double any previous CSEI count.
- Several of the people we met through our Street Outreach program are families with small children or couples who could not be separated. Dubuque shelters are consistently operating at capacity and are unable to meet the needs of families.
- The housing crisis continues to be the principal cause of homelessness. There's not much profit in low-income housing for a developer, so it's a tough sell. Some progress is being made, and we need to keep at it.
- The US Department of Treasury's Emergency Rental Assistance 2 program helped prevent hundreds of evictions in eastern lowa. This program ends in September 2025 and was CSEI's largest and most course-altering funding for the past three years.
- The proposed federal budget cuts will hurt. If there are fewer vouchers and less case management, there will be strong, negative, ripple effects in our community, with an estimated 10-15% increase in visible homelessness in lowa alone.

CSEI continues our daily boots-on-the-ground approach. We are keeping people in their homes and finding homes for those who are homeless. We are building workable plans with our participants for long-term success and looking for ways to adapt and improve our services.

We hope you will join us in this critical work of helping people survive and exit homelessness.

Program Overview

CSEI has three main programs, all which provide critical services to individuals and families experiencing a housing crisis:



Housing Helpline

Individuals at risk of homelessness in Delaware or Dubuque counties are encouraged to call the Housing Helpline to access information, referrals, and resources in their communities related to housing instability or homelessness.

Street Outreach

Outreach program with emphasis on reaching those living unsheltered and providing basic needs and referrals to housing support resources and shelter services.

Housing Assistance

Rapid Rehousing

Short and medium-term rental assistance and case management for individuals and families who are homeless.

Homeless Prevention

Short-term rental assistance for individuals and families who are at imminent risk of homelessness.

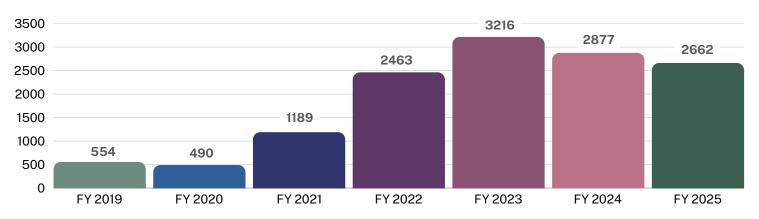
Tenant Based Rental Assistance

Rental assistance for individuals and families who are homeless or at risk of homelessness.

CSEI first met Brett during the annual PIT count. Though he didn't come out of his tent that day, we left a small first-aid kit with our contact information inside, hoping he might reach out.

A few days later, when CSEI staff returned, we finally had the chance to meet Brett (and the pups) in person. That's when we learned Brett's story. He had been camping with his brother, but after his brother's passing, Brett was left to face the challenges of homelessness alone. He shared how hard it was to work full time while worrying about leaving his dogs at camp with no one to care for them. Life outside, he admitted, just wasn't the same anymore. CSEI worked with Brett through Street Outreach until he was assisted with our TBRA program less than a month later.

Today, Brett is stably housed, working, and caring for his dogs in the safety of his own home.

Latasha is a single mom of two. Her first and only episode of homelessness was sudden and thankfully brief. One incident changed her life and left her homeless with her two kids. She was quickly enrolled in CSEI's Rapid Rehousing Program and moved into an apartment. Latasha successfully completed CSEI's Rapid Rehousing Program this year and has maintained permanent and stable housing for herself and her two children.

Point-in-Time Count

The Point-in-Time (PIT) Count is an annual count of both sheltered and unsheltered individuals experiencing homelessness on a single night in January. The count provides critical data that helps communities understand the scope of homelessness and informs funding, services, and policy decisions.

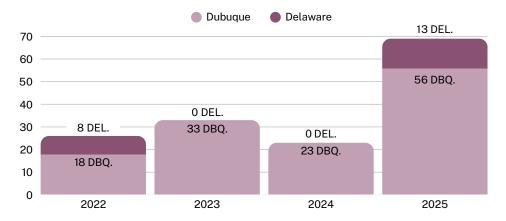
Each year, CSEI coordinates this important effort for our area, bringing together city officials, law enforcement, local nonprofits, and community volunteers. In addition to the January count, we also conduct a summer count to survey the number of unsheltered individuals experiencing homelessness. This helps us gain a more accurate understanding of homelessness across different seasons.

Volunteers consistently describe the experience as powerful and transformative. Many report gaining a deeper understanding of homelessness, a stronger connection to the needs of our community, and a lasting personal impact through their involvement.

"This was my fourth time volunteering for this event, and the high number has me worried we might be seeing the canary in the coal mine. Full-fledged homeless, camping, hiding, homelessness is the most brutal way of life imaginable in this country. I don't think people appreciate how dehumanizing it must be to live under those circumstances; at least I couldn't feel fully human.

PIT has reiterated to me that the relationships CSEI builds are critical to these people - despite their often unwillingness to accept help. Volunteering for PIT is helpful in rebuilding my empathy for how bad some of these folks have it."

"I did not know that many persons hide their place. I know these folks appreciate and need their privacy. I think many people have little understanding of this issue. They wonder why they are homeless not realizing there is a "story" behind the choice."

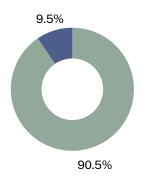

Government \$1,515,961

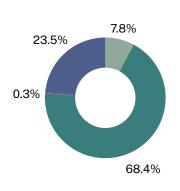
